The most remarkable thing about William is that he does everything he possibly can on his own. He understands that his disability gets in the way sometimes of doing things us "walkers" do. But he doesn't let it stop him from living a full, rewarding life. He takes it all in stride with his self-deprecating humor. Out of all the kids at University High, he may be the one of the most well-loved and outgoing. There's always someone coming over to say hello.

After graduating from high school, William plans on attending WVU. He wants to go into medicine or music or both. He isn't quite sure how to combine them at this point.
